A Short Guide on National Park Etiquette

In the National Park consideration is paramount, as our shared aim is to protect nature and its animals. Each of us can help by following these simple steps: use the bus or the train to get to the park, take your rubbish with you, refrain from lighting campfires, keep quiet and stay on the marked paths. The impact we humans have is greater than one might think.


The forest in the National Park is constantly changing and returning to its untamed form. Trees grow, age, fall an die. Their dead wood provides valuable habitat for rare fungi, lichens, mosses, beetles and other insects.

Forest fires endanger this habitat. Unfortunately, we see an increased risk due to severe climate change. Almost all forest fires (90 percent) are caused by human behaviour. Important information on how to prevent them is provided by the Federal Office for Civil Protection and Disaster Assistance.

The National Park Gates are central starting points for your visit to the National Park, as they are easily accessible by public transport and also have sufficient parking spaces for cars and buses. You can obtain all important information about



the National Park and the National Park region at our counters in the visitor centers. The gates are meeting points for ranger tours, and they are also the starting point for many cycling and hiking trails that lead through the National Park. Near each National Park Gate is a trekking camp that invites you to spend the night in the wilderness. Each gate offers specific highlights. It is therefore worthwhile to explore all of them to discover the different facets of the National Park.

Experience the Forest and Moors

The Erbeskopf National
Park Gate is located at the
foot of the highest mountain in Rhineland-Palatinate. Our colleagues at
the counter are available
to offer advice and
assistance, ensuring
that you have all relevant information
about the National
Park and the region.

At the Erbeskopf National Park Gate, you will meet our rangers, who invite you to join them on a ranger tour on selected days. Digital tours offered in the National Park also start here and take you along signposted paths through the National Park.

The indoor exhibition is not just for rainy days; it offers an interactive, mysterious, and multimedia insight into the National Park.

The outdoor exhibition "Nature knows no boundaries" offers the opportunity to look beyond the boundaries of the National Park. The surrounding cultural landscapes offer further exciting potential for preserving ecological diversity.

The Wildenburg National Park Gate

Watch Animals & Marvel at Rocks

The rocky landscape around Wildenburg Castle is one of the National Park's special attractions. bizarrely shaped quartzite rocks are its centrepiece.

Go on a journey of discovery: you can marvel at the rocks on your own or book our ranger tour. At the so-called "Rosselhalden", the small rock seas, you will experience the untouched nature of the National Park up close.

For animal lovers, the nearby wildlife park offers the opportunity to observe wild animals at close range. The enclosure is currently undergoing renovation.

We invite you to visit the Wildenburg for a panoramic experience. After climbing 80 steps, you will be rewarded with a fantastic 360° view of both Hunsrück and Hochwald.

Meet the Rangers

Insights into the Work in the National Park

Rangers are officially known in Germany as nature guards, nature conservation guards or national park guards. They work in national nature reserves, for nature conservation authorities and at biological stations. In the Hunsrück-Hochwald National Park, our rangers are regularly out and about on inspection and observation tours. See what the rangers do – meet them in the field! The rangers are happy to answer any questions you may have about the National Park. The best places to meet them are the National Park Gates, the signposted hiking trails in the National Park or by going on a tour with them.



Ranger Tours

Regular ranger tours take place between April and October at all three National Park Gates and at the ranger stations in Muhl and Thranenweier. These free tours for families and individual travellers offer the opportunity to accompany the rangers and learn more about their work in the National Park. The tours vary in length and last approx. 2–3 hours.







Nature Experience Tours

Out and About With the National Park Guides

Like rangers, national park guides are specially trained and, as forest educators and certified nature and landscape guides, have extensive knowledge of flora and fauna.

The national park guides offer a wide range of activities, from guided hikes and bike tours to guided tours on special topics such as moors, Rosselhalden or Celts. Whether in German, English, French or Hunsrücker Platt, the tours are tailored to your individual needs. The national park guides look forward to your enquiry.









Cycling

You can explore the National Park via ten signposted cycle paths. All National Park Gates are accessible by bike. The routes connect the neighbouring villages and are linked to the National Park Cycle Route. This allows you to experience nature up close and in a sustainable way. The paths lead through unspoilt forest land-scapes. Please stay on the designated cycle paths! Footpaths, narrow trails and management paths are off limits to ensure that humans and nature can coexist respectfully.

On the permitted routes, you will find a mixture of forest and woodland paths, often with challenging gradients and coarse gravel. When going downhill, be on the lookout for bumps in the trail. Always stay alert, as you will be sharing the paths with hikers, who always have right of way. Also, remember that you are in a wilderness area: falling dead wood and trees are natural hazards. On stormy days, it is advisable to avoid the forest to be on the safe side.

Enjoy the tour – but please be careful and respect nature.

Premium Hiking

On the Trails Into the Wilderness



Saar-Hunsrück Climb

The multi-award-winning SaarHunsrück-Steig premium long-distance hiking trail covers 415 km from Perl in Saarland to Boppard on the Rhine. Four stages (stages 9–12) of this very popular hiking trail lead through the Hunsrück-Hochwald National Park. Starting in Nonnweiler, you hike over the Celtic ring wall, through beech forests, moors, over the Erbeskopf and to the Wildenburg castle ruins to Idar-Oberstein.

Use the app to receive exciting additional information, quiz questions, and much more – a perfect addition to the tour guides that brings things to life which are not always visible. Trekking Camps

Sleep under the stars, wake up to birdsong and experience sunrise in the great outdoors: that's what our trekking camps offer. Whether you're travelling alone, as a couple, with your family or as a small hiking group, our trekking camps are the perfect place for wilderness and adventure – or for those hiking the Saar-Hunsrück Climb.

There are three trekking camps in the Hunsrück-Hochwald National Park, each with two platforms. These are located near our National Park Gates at Wildenburg, Erbeskopf and Keltenpark. The camps are connected by hiking trails in daily stages. They are located away from the villages, hidden in nature and can only be reached on foot. Trekkers must bring their own water and food. Lighting fires is prohibited.

National Park Church

In the middle of the National Park, in the Hunsrück village of Neuhütten-Muhl, stands the St. Josef National Park Church. A variety of events are held under the title "National Park Church". It is also a destination for pilgrimages. Dates, starting points and themes can be found on the internet or in the local daily press. The National Park Creation Trail starts nearby. This is where spirituality meets nature and culture.





National Park for All

Experience the Hunsrück-Hochwald National Park Without Barriers

Whether you face hearing, walking, or visual impairments or language and comprehension barriers, everyone should be able to experience the extraordinary nature and culture of the National Park. The Hunsrück-Hochwald National Park warmly welcomes people with disabilities and offers a wide range of accessible facilities so that everyone can enjoy this special place.





For people with walking disabilities: The indoor and outdoor exhibitions at the Erbeskopf National Park Gate are partially accessible according to Reisen für Alle (Travel for All) standards. The island tour (length: 2 km, start: Ranger base Thranenweier, An der K49, 54422 Börfink) can also be explored on your own with the app. Ranger tours are also offered on certain dates between April and October for the island tour.

For people with hearing impairments: The indoor exhibition at the Erbeskopf National Park Gate is partially accessible according to Reisen für Alle (Travel for All). Mobile FM systems can be booked for all tours. Self-guided tours can be found in the National Park app.

For people with visual impairments: The island tour (length: 2 km, start: Ranger base Thranenweier, An der K49, 54422 Börfink) has a tour description in Braille. The audio CD can be borrowed in advance. Alternatively, there is an audio tour in the app. (The app does not contain the content of the audio CD, but rather an audio tour of the Arnika Moor Circular Trail.)

For people with cognitive impairments: Arnika Moor Circular Trail in easy language with the app (length: 2 km, start: Ranger station Thranenweier, An der K49, 54422 Börfink).

RESEARCH

Research in the National Park

In the Hunsrück-Hochwald National Park, nature can develop over a large area with virtually no human influence. But what happens in these wilderness areas and how can it help us to interact with nature outside the National Park?

To shed light on this, the Hunsrück-Hochwald National Park is working with many research institutions and other protected areas. Dr Andrea Kaus-Thiel is responsible for this research collaboration at the National Park administration. The biologist, who holds a doctorate, has been working at the National Park since 2016. Before that, she taught natural sciences and biology at schools.


Andrea, what is so exciting about a national park?

The wonderful thing is letting go. Nature is allowed to develop in the national park with virtually no intervention, and whatever happens, happens. This also helps biodiversity and is nature conservation alongside "classic" nature conservation or species and biotope protection. We can observe these areas through monitoring and research and learn from nature in the process. In the context of climate change, it is of course very interesting to see how nature is coping with the changes. Who are the "winners" and who are the "losers"? Another exciting question is: What adaptation mechanisms are at work that we are not yet aware of?

What exactly can research achieve here?

With the many research projects, some of which are running over a longer period of time, we are taking a close look. This helps to create understanding of difficult issues. After all, research and the data it generates sometimes provide insights that can help us to better understand the world, our planet, our ecosystem, and also this national park. And we would like to share this new knowledge. That is why the findings are incorporated into our exhibitions, tours and environmental education programmes.





What research projects are currently underway?

There are so many that I can't name them all here. In addition to classic monitoring, which is ongoing observation without a specific question in mind, there are also some specific research questions that are currently being addressed. One example is the carrion ecology project. It is being conducted in almost all German national parks and is investigating a virtually unexplored ecosystem: carcasses. What may seem disgusting to some at first glance reveals a fascinating biodiversity.

RESEARCH

Mosaic of Habitats

The flora and fauna in the Hunsrück-Hochwald National Park offer many special features and some unique characteristics. Old-growth beech forests interspersed with hillside moors make up about half of the Hunsrück-Hochwald National Park. Most of the trees here are red beech, a species that is relatively rare globally. These trees are allowed to grow old, decay, rot and regenerate themselves. Old beech forests are considered a highly endangered habitat throughout Europe.

Species-rich Habitats

The Federal Agency for Nature Conservation already considers the area a "hotspot region for biological diversity". Wildcats, black storks and black woodpeckers find a habitat here. Red deer, roe deer and wild boar are also widespread. However, the smaller species that inhabit old wood, moors and forest meadows are of outstanding importance for nature conservation. 1,400 species of beetles find their habitat in dead wood, 17 species of bats depend on caves in dead trees and 1,500 species of fungi decompose the wood substance.

Bark Bugs (Aradidae)

These tiny bugs measure just a few millimetres and live hidden in old and dead wood. Of the 25 known species of bark bugs in Germany, all feed on wood-decaying fungi. Where bark bugs are found, the forest is truly close to nature.

Nine species of bark bugs have currently been identified in the Hunsrück-Hochwald National Park. This means that the species diversity is very high compared to other near-natural forests.



The Tinder Fungus (Fomes fomentarius)

This fungus likes to attack weakened deciduous trees. That is why it is particularly common in natural deciduous forests with lots of dead wood. Many insect species, especially larvae, feed on tinder fungus, such as bark beetles and beetle species. It therefore increases biodiversity and provides food and habitat for other species.





RESEARCH

National Park Treasure Trove

The University of Koblenz is a key research partner of the Hunsrück-Hochwald National Park. For many years, Prof. Dr. Eberhard Fischer and Dr. Dorothee Killmann from the University's Biology Department have conducted research in the protected area. Together with Burkhard Leh and other colleagues, they discovered a new species of red algae in the moorland streams of the National Park. This discovery marks the second new species described in the National Park, following the discovery of the lichen *Verrucaria hunsrueckensis* (Hunsrück wart lichen) back in 2015.

Ms Killmann, Mr Fischer, what is so special about the newly discovered red algae?

The new red algae Hoefkenia hunsrueckensis is not only a new species, but even a new genus. It was always referred to as Vosges frog spawn algae. Intensive DNA analysis then showed that it is a new genus of algae. That was quite a discovery!

What does this say about the area?

The National Park is truly a treasure trove for the Hunsrück. It is quite extraordinary in Central Europe to discover a new genus with the Hunsrück red algae and a new species with the Hunsrück wart lichen. This demonstrates the special importance of this area for nature conservation. With its very old beech forests, the Rosselhalden and the hillside moors that are up to 3,000 years old, there are very different biotopes in a very small area, providing many habitats for a truly impressive number of species. There is probably still a lot here that we have not yet discovered.





The Hunsrück Wart Lichen (Verrucaria hunsrueckensis)

This lichen is a new species, discovered in 2015. Lichens usually consist of three symbiotic partners: two fungi and one alga. They are true survivalists; this symbiosis allows them to colonize habitats that fungi or algae alone could not.

The Hunsrück Red Algae

(Hoefkenia hunsrueckensis)

The Hunsrück red algae, newly described in 2024, is predominant in the moorland streams of the National Park. It grows in clean and clear spring areas of nutrient-poor streams. It is an important bioindicator of very good water quality. The new genus of red algae was named after the former Rhineland-Palatinate Environment Minister Ulrike Höfken, who was instrumental in establishing the National Park.





IN DIALOGUE

National Park Academy and Citizens' Forum

The National Park Academy and the Citizens' Forum Are Central Events of the Hunsrück-Hochwald National Park That Promote Citizen Participation and Open Dialogue.

The National Park Academy is a regular series of lectures, each focusing on a different topic related to the National Park. Participation is open to anyone interested, whether residents of the region, visitors, schoolchildren, students, experts or partners of the National Park.

In addition, the National Park Authority invites the public to a citizens' forum at least once a year. This event serves to inform the population at an early stage about current developments and plans in the National Park and to actively involve them in decision-making processes. In the citizens' forum, participants have the opportunity to ask questions and discuss planned measures such as the National Park plan or the trail map.

Both the National Park Academy and the citizens' forum can be attended free of charge and without prior registration.


